Access to Cancer Care For Low-Income and Uninsured Patients

We hope this information is helpful if you are looking for cancer treatment or cancer screening, like a mammogram, Pap test, or prostate exam, and do not have insurance or enough money to pay for medical care.

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I want to be checked for cancer. Where do I go?

If you want to be checked for cancer and:

- You live in Bexar County
- You make a low income
- You do not have health insurance
- You cannot get Medicare or Medicaid

You may be able to get help through one of the programs listed below. Each one may have different rules about how you qualify for services, so call the number listed for more information.

★ **University Health System – CareLink**

CareLink is a program of the **University Health System** and **Bexar County**. CareLink is not insurance. If you qualify for CareLink, you pay a monthly amount that is based on how much you make and how many people are in your family. You must make an appointment to enroll in CareLink.

To enroll in CareLink, you do not need a social security card or number. You must show how much money you make, so you will need to show a paycheck stub or tax return. You will also have to show that you live in Bexar County. You may bring a water bill, electric bill, your apartment lease or your driver's license. You will be asked how many family members live in your house. You do not have to be a U. S. citizen to get help. But if you have any documents (like visas) from Immigration and Naturalization Services (INS), you must show these.

★ Federally Qualified Health Centers

If you cannot get help from the Indigent Health Care Program, you may be able to see a doctor at a Primary Care clinic that will let you pay on a “**sliding scale.**” This means that the amount of money you pay is based on how many family members live in your house and how much money you make. For example, if you have a big family and make just a little money, you would pay less for medical care. If you have a smaller family or make a little more money, you would pay a little more.

★ **The Good Samaritan Center**

The Good Samaritan Center of Fredericksburg serves the low-income, uninsured and underinsured residents of the Texas Hill Country with affordable **cancer screenings**. The patient's cost is \$15 to \$25 per visit, depending upon their family income. Laboratory fees, x-rays, and other tests are additional, although they are offered at a 95% discount. The center provides what medicines it can at no cost and continues to add new services as needs demand, and time and finances permit.

For Women

★ Women who want to get checked for **cervical cancer or breast cancer** may be able to get help through a special program called **Breast and Cervical Cancer Services (BCCS)**.

- To have a PAP test for cervical cancer, you must be 18 to 64 years old.
- To have a mammogram (breast cancer test), you must be 50 to 64 years old.
- You will need to show how much money you make, so you may be asked to show a paycheck stub.

★ **Alamo Breast Cancer Foundation**

Alamo Breast Cancer Foundation provides **free mammograms** (breast cancer test) for women who do not qualify for BCCS or Medicaid/Medicare coverage of mammography. Also gives lessons on early detection, breast self-examination and healthy lifestyles for women at poverty level.

Appointments

When you go for your appointment, be sure to bring any medical records you have. This information will help the doctor understand your needs better. For example, bring:

- Results of past medical or lab tests
- Records of any treatments you have had
- A list of any medicines you are taking right now
